Word from the LMC

Welcome to Newham LMC's new look newsletter. It has been some time since we have sent out a newsletter but we have been very busy working on your behalf since the last one.

The LMC meets regularly with Newham CCG to discuss a range of issues affecting GPs and have provided feedback on the Extended Access Specification, the Latent TB Testing Project and the Extended Primary Care Strategy. We have also provided feedback on the Estates Strategy and will monitor how the CCG take on board the LMC's comments. As the Transforming Services Together and Sustainability and Transformation Plans are rolled out across North East London we will continue to feedback GPs' views and concerns regarding these projects.

Representatives from the LMC have met with the Public Health team to discuss issues and concerns including sexual health services and health checks. As the Health and Well-Being Board becomes a key player within the borough the LMC will continue to look for ways to develop stronger links with colleagues from the local authority.

In order to provide better support to our constituents the LMC has decided to implement a buddy system and every practice in the borough now has an identified LMC representative who should be making contact with you over the next few weeks. GP State of Emergency

At the Londonwide LMC's annual conference, Michelle Drage announced the Londonwide campaign in response to the current crisis in general practice. GP State of Emergency aims to:

- Provide practices with resources to help them appropriately manage their workload.
- Help practices to engage with their PPGs we need our patients to understand the limitations within which we work and to become the public voice for our practices.
- Raise awareness of the reasons behind the current GP crisis.

GP Federation

On 9 December a Federation Event was held at West Ham at which GPs voted overwhelmingly in favour of setting up one pan-Newham GP Federation. It was agreed that the LMC would facilitate a Steering Group and the CCG would provide project and funding support. The Steering Group which is chaired by Dr Saidur Rahman is in the process of setting up arrangements the consideration of caretaking contracts, timescales for project implementation, shareholding arrangements and procurement and tendering processes. A Board election has now taken place and the details of the successful candidates would be published shortly.

Further consideration would also include arrangements for CCG funding, practice investment, assurance and contracting. The Steering Group will also be looking to develop relationships with Newham providers and further information will be circulated to practices as the plans are developed.

PMS Contract Review

There is still a pause in PMS negotiations both in terms of Londonwide and local discussions. Full details can be found in the <u>Londonwide PMS Bulletin 6</u>, <u>6 Extra</u> and <u>Bulletin 7</u>. We will keep you up-to-date on further developments.

Transforming Services Together (TST)

The TST project was formed in September 2014 with the aim of improving the local health and social care economy in North East London and provides a local response to the Five Year Forward View. The project team consists of representatives from Newham, Tower Hamlets and Waltham Forest CCGs, along with representatives from Barts Health NHS Trust and a range of other stakeholders. Presentations have been given to the local LMCs by the TST project group to provide an opportunity to feedback into the process from the general practice perspective.

Cessation of Antenatal Rubella Susceptibility Screening

Rubella is considered to no longer be a common disease of childhood and is defined by the WHO as having been eliminated in the UK. This is a result of the Mumps, Measles and Rubella (MMR) vaccination programme (however there are concerns that if MMR vaccination rates continue to drop then cases of rubella will reappear).

The announcement on cessation of the screening in pregnancy was made in January this year and from 1 April 2016, pregnant women in England will no longer be offered screening for rubella susceptibility. This action follows reviews of the evidence by the UK National Screening Committee (UK NSC) in 2003 and 2012 which, on both occasions, found that the evidence showed that screening for rubella susceptibility during pregnancy did not meet the UK NSC criteria for a screening programme. The Rubella Susceptibility Screening policy review highlighted the following conclusions:

- the low incidence of congenital rubella syndrome
- screening in pregnancy does not contribute to the reduction of risk of the unborn baby in the current pregnancy
- the test may falsely reassure some women that they are not susceptible to rubella infection
- stopping antenatal screening is unlikely to result in increased rates of congenital rubella.

Hospital Test Results-Use the templates

NHS England, in conjunction with the Academy of Royal Colleges, has <u>recently published guidance</u> on standards for the communication of patient diagnostic test results on discharge from hospital. Of interest is the standards in section 3 which have been developed form the key principles. The key point is:

'the clinician who orders the test is responsible for reviewing, acting and communicating the result and actions taken to the GP and patient even if the patient has been discharged'.

The GPC has added templates in line with this guidance-so please use them when sending inappropriate requests back. Chaand Nagpaul, chair of GPC, has also written to CCGs, not just to clarify the situation,

but also to ask CCGs to put in place a service alert system for when the secondary care provider is not complying with these standards.

An existing Quality First template to reject inappropriate requests to follow up hospital investigations.

A <u>new template</u> to send copies of test results back to hospitals to ensure/confirm they have been actioned by the requesting clinician.

A <u>new template</u> to let the CCG know if the above principles are being breached, so that appropriate commissioning levers can be applied.

RCGP Guide to Supporting Information for Appraisal & Revalidation 2016

Last month saw the publication of the new RCGP Appraisal & Revalidation Guide. This guide has been significantly revised, informed by an extensive survey the RCGP undertook last year. The RCGP recognised that the current requirements had become too cumbersome and bureaucratic with some of the conditions being interpreted in an overly complex way, so that the majority of GPs felt the whole process had become burdensome. There is a welcome shift in emphasis in the guide to a more supportive and less onerous appraisal process. Find the RCGP guide here:
